MESSAGE FROM THE CEO/PRINCIPAL, DR RANA

Dear Parents, Carers and GEMS World Academy Community,

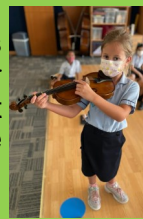


DR PATIL'S TIP OF THE WEEK

G5 to G6 TRANSITION UPDATE :

To help our Grade 5 PYP students transition smoothly into our G6 MYP, we have developed an ongoing program that includes the following:

3rd June: Grade 6 "Peer Mentoring" Q&A session. G6 students will visit G5 students and host a second Q&A session (first session took place in March).

6th June: G5 "Transitions" Unit of Inquiry. G5 students complete this unit throughout June

22nd – 24th June: "Step Up Days". G5 students experience a full MYP scheduled timetable for 2 days to meet the MYP teachers, use the different learning platforms and be introduced to their secondary school subjects.

There will be a second zoom-based Parent Meeting, hosted by the MYP Coordinator Mr. Jon Howarth, in early June. This session will introduce some aspects of the MYP Curriculum to parents, and look deeper into the Transitions process for the G5 students.
